Lodge Lockers

A limited number of lockers are available for regular users of our lodge at Iwikau, Mt Ruapehu. In past years, there have been more people wanting lockers than were available. Last year, several lockers were cleaned out, the contents stored for a couple of months, and a notice to that effect was published in the Beechleaves newsletter. We now have a better idea about who has what locker, and wish to ensure that locker holders are also lodge users.

The committee has agreed that lodge locker holders will be charged for the equivalent of two night's accommodation (\$42.00) as well as the usual annual locker fee. The additional fee will be credited towards the cost of the locker holder's lodge usage during the current year; in effect, the first two night's accommodation has been paid in advance.

Please note:

- The additional fee is not refundable.
- The credit is only valid until the next AGM (e.g. May 2008), and may be used by people associated with the locker holder's membership (e.g. the person named as a single member, or a family member of a family membership).
- When making a booking, please advise the Lodge Booking Officers that you wish to use your locker holder's credit.

If you no longer require a locker, then please notify the Membership Secretary and return your locker key as soon as possible. Likewise, let the Membership Secretary know if you wish to have a locker.

Please understand that this move has been made in fairness to the regular lodge users who require a locker, and to get the best use of a limited resource.

Notification of Possum Control in the Manawatu Gorge

DoC has contracted Target Pest Contracting Ltd for a restrict/elimination of possum activities on native flora and fauna within the Manawatu Gorge. This will take 5-6 weeks to complete and be between early June until the end of July. The 1,665 hectare area will comprise DoC reserve, railways and highways, plus privately owned farmland. Control is by pellet, and bait bags and stations.

The times listed below include tramping, rest and meal stops. In assessing the trip times and grades, terrain, weather and party fitness (a party is as fast as its slowest member) must be considered. As these factors will never repeat themselves, times are only estimates. Contact the trip leader if you are unsure about trip gradings for a specific trip.

ALL All welcome

EASY 4 hours per day, pace slower than Easy/Med. Does not relate to terrain.

EASY/MEDIUM MEDIUM MEDIUMThours per day at a pace slower than medium.

Thours per day at a standard walking pace.

MEDIUM/FIT

Shours per day at a pace faster than medium.

FIT Over 8 hours per day at a pace faster than medium/fit.

TECHNICAL Qualifying requirements to be announced by the trip organiser.

Top Maropea Hut

This trip starts from the Sunrise road end, heads up through Sunrise Hut, Armstrong Saddle and up and over to Top Maropea Hut, which is a four berth affair, so people need to be equipped to sleep out or on the floor. Each year MTSC runs a series of Winter alpine courses, covering the skills needed to safely enjoy tramping and/or climbing above the bush line. Topics covered in AIC1 include alpine equipment, travelling on snow, snow shelters, avalanche awareness, and keeping yourself and the rest of your party safe even if your day goes pear-shaped. This course is for everyone who tramps or ventures to the mountains in Winter, and includes two nights at Manawatu Lodge on Mt Ruapehu. The club can provide gear if you do not already have an ice axe and crampons.

AIC2 – Intermediate snowcraft - follows two weeks later, and provides an introduction to other mountaineering techniques. Competency to the level of AIC1 is a pre-requisite.

Opportunities to try out your snow skills are listed on the trip card and usually have a grading of "technical".

Transport and accommodation costs are \$40 and \$42 (for members) respectively. Please book as early as possible.




