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UPCOMING TRIPS

Ratapu Preview: 29 May (fit).

From Mangaroa Rd cross farmland & up a good bush spur to spot 669. SW along ridge to Ratapu (bit of leatherwood here) & continue on down to shallow saddle. Will follow track down spur & back to road. If time allows may check out a track down to the Ngapuketurua Stream. Contact Dave Harrington.

Midweek trips:

The list of midweek trip leaders usually included is missing from this issue but will be back in the June one. In the meantime, please contact the midweek trip convenor, Bev Akers (or one of the usual suspects). At the time of going to press, the usual departure times for each have not changed – Wednesday 0800, Thursday 0730 from outside the Rose & Crown, Terrace End.

PREVIEW Carrington Ridge Loop Medium Adam Matich 359-2796

This not very long day trip will start from the Holdsworth road end from where we will head up the Mt Holdsworth track to the Totara Flats track junction. We will leave the main track & back-track along the old track to the top of Carrington Ridge. We will follow the well-marked trail down Carrington Ridge to 640 m ASL, where there is a track junction & we will hook a left to drop into Gentle Annie Saddle for lunch (2 ½ hours). Normally, what would happen after lunch is that we would climb out the other side of the saddle to 670 & out through the Forest Lookout, & people are welcome to do so if they wish. What I intend to do is take the briefer, & new route (for me anyway) out by dropping directly from the saddle into Gentle Annie Creek & following it out, if indeed that is possible. I would expect it to take only an hour or so!

Rangiwahia Hut & Beyond Preview

May 7/8 – Easy

Exactly where we go will be weather dependent but the general plan is to wander up to Rangiwahia Hut on Saturday (2-3 hours). Part way along there is a short, steepish 30-40 minute detour around an active slip. The detour comes out just before the beautiful arched wooden bridge crossing the Mangahuia Stream. The track then heads to Rangiwahia Hut.

On Sunday we will head, weather permitting, along Deadmans Track by following the track up the tussock ridge on to the tops of the Whanahuia Range. We will then head south to the Mangahuia Trig on the return trip to the car park. (5-6 hours). Leader is Linda Campbell.

Booking & use of the MTSC Transit Van

The normal run-of-the-mill things you need to do if using the Transit Van are:

- 1. Book preferably by Thursday, and certainly no later than 6 pm Friday.
- 2. Cancel bookings by these times so others needing the van have time to amend travel arrangements.
- 3. A fly should be carried on every tramp, there is always one in the passenger door of the club van and they are available from the Gear Custodian at no charge. There is a Personal Locator Beacon, in the glove box, for people using the van to take with them

Trip leaders and those planning trips should use this club asset. Adam Matich is our minibus custodian and he can be contacted at (06) 359 2796 or at work (06) 953 7679.

Club Equipment

We have two personal locator beacons (PLB), packs, 2 and 3 person tents, fly-sheets, snow mats, sleeping bag cover, gas cookers, size 8 and 9 boots, billies, two bivvy bags and two big tent flies. Ice axes, crampons, and helmets are also available. Food Dehydrator: ideal for drying large and small quantities of fruit, vegetables, and meat for tramping rips.
